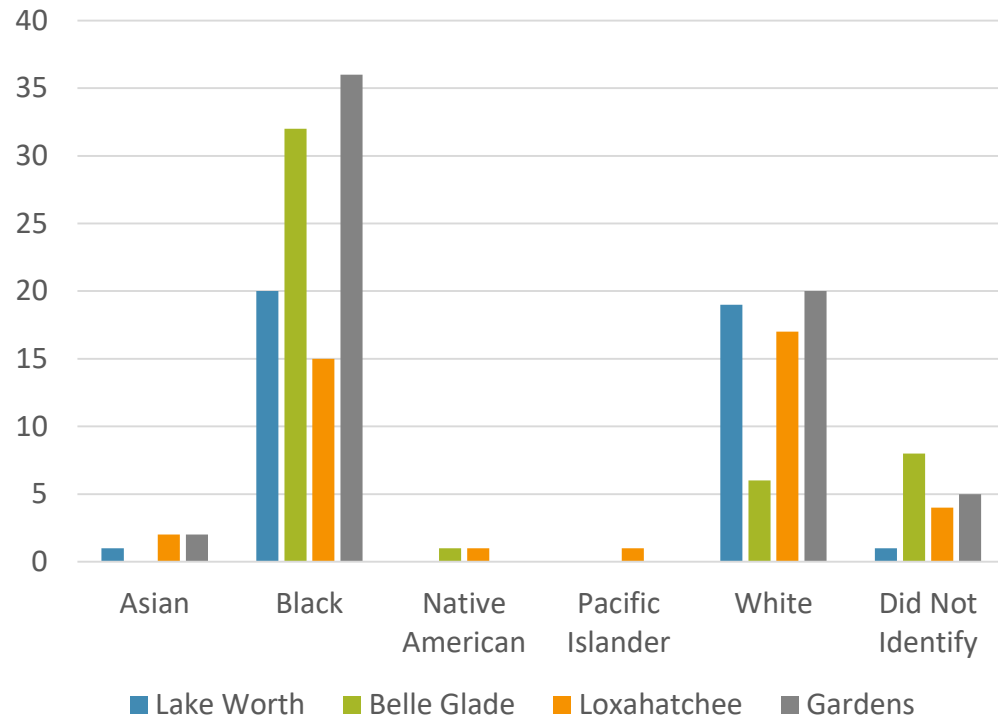
FY 2020 PBSC Attendee Comparison



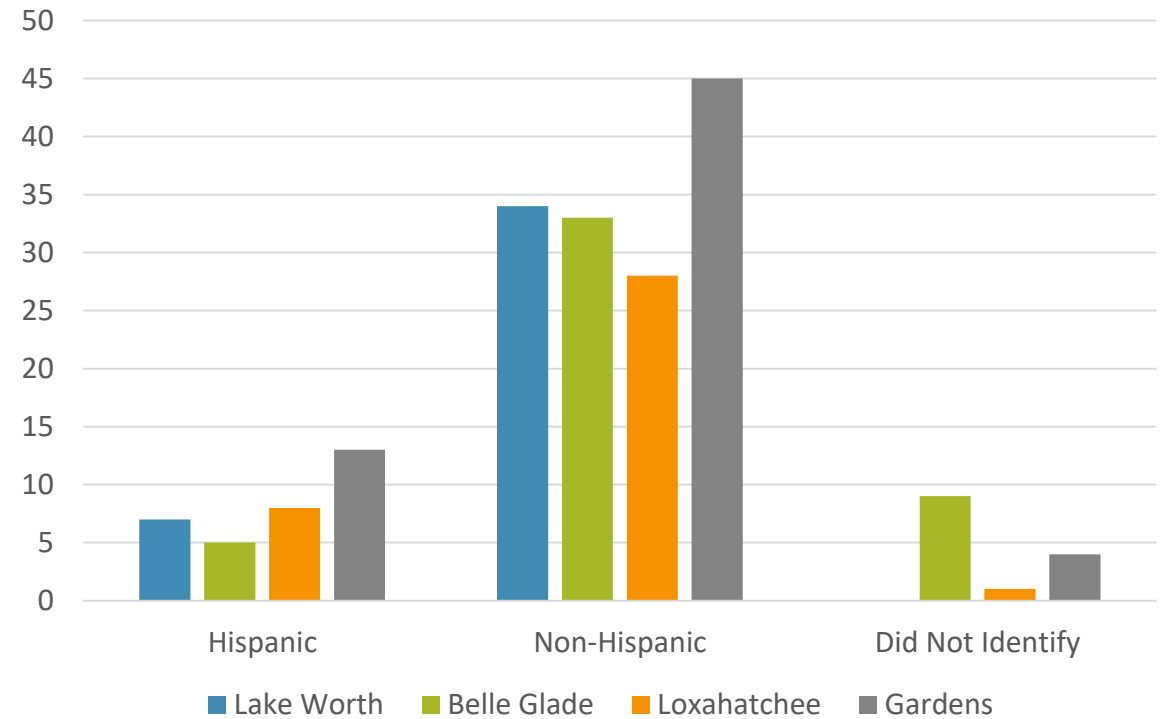

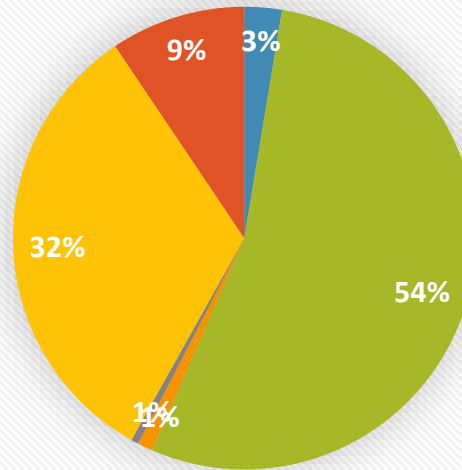

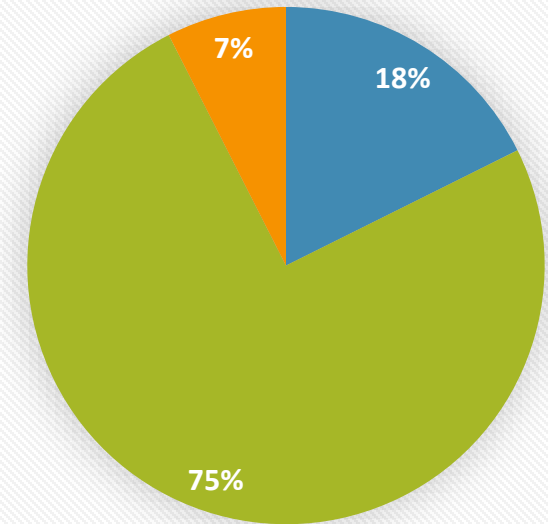

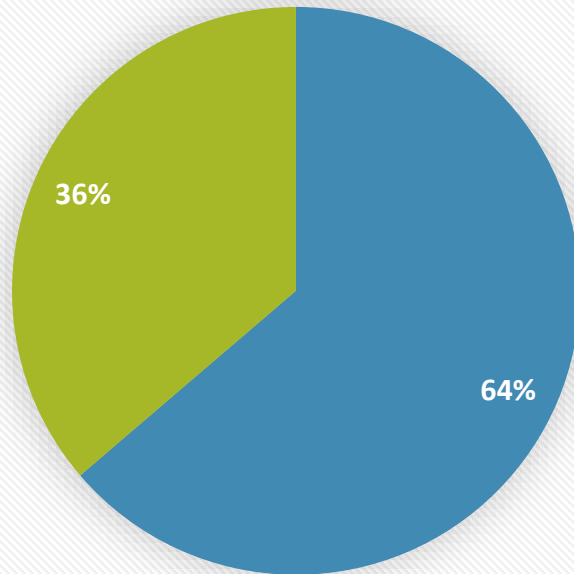

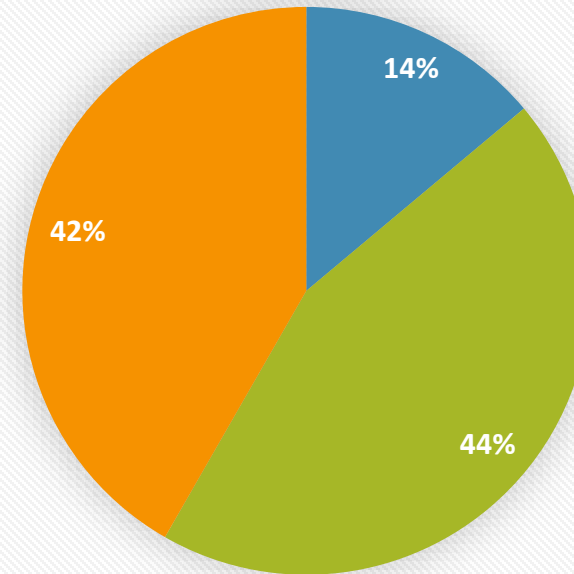

Economic Access

Transportation:

- Link with education so kids can get to schools with better programs; expand transportation systems with recommendations from local cities (ex. City of Delray metro trolley system; free Palm Tran passes for students who stay after school).

Financial Concerns:

- Cost of extracurricular activities; many are de-incentivised to join activities that could bring economic opportunity (scholarships).

Poverty:

- Affordable childcare so people can work full-time; look at the link between poverty and graduation rates (there may be things going on at home like money issues, no food on the table, students staying up with siblings while parents at working); link with vocational programs to provide additional resources for those who will not or cannot go to traditional college.

Unemployment/ Job Opportunities:

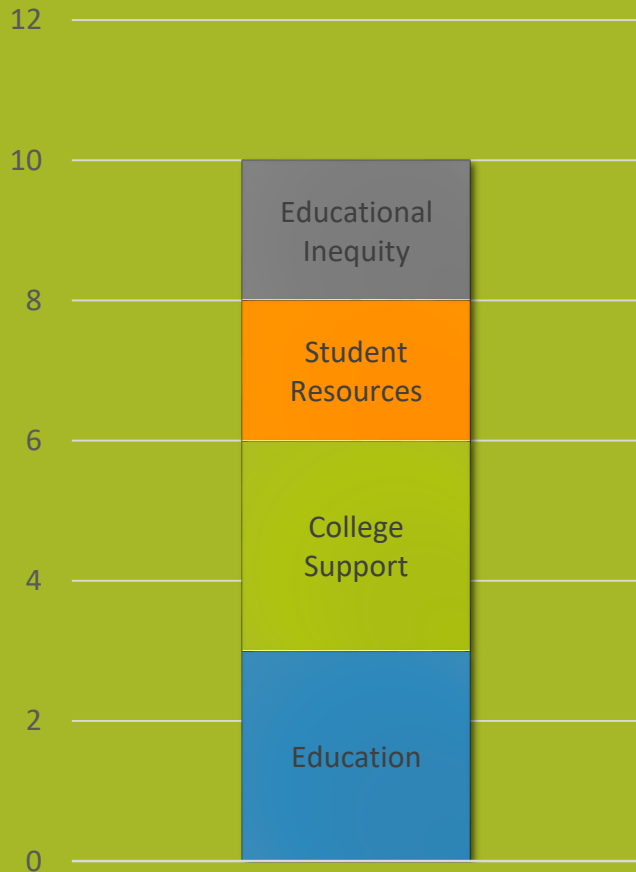
- Increase job opportunities for young people (15-18) with better working conditions.

Homelessness/ Housing:

- Homeless teens & food insecurities; increase Habitat for Humanity homes and allow for more affordable housing options; better conditions at shelters; disparity of poverty across zip codes; tailor solutions towards communities whose populations may be below the poverty line.

Educational Supports/ Achieve PBC

Educational Inequity:

- Standardized tests don't test your knowledge; where you live limits your education options. Transportation makes it difficult to get to the schools with the better programs. Add more electives and class options (leveled with IB schools)

Student Resources:

- Provide more info about scholarships, internships, youth programs; counselors to build individual plans with each kids to help with their different futures; expand AVID classes (teaching life skills ex. taxes, FAFSA, college loans, etc.)

College Support:

- Need more help once in college(with loans); start college planning in Middle School.

Education:

- Drop out rates in the Glades; kids are not receiving their diplomas then having a hard time finding jobs.

Health & Wellness

Community Safety:

- Creating safe places to workout outdoors; more lights, more park rangers/community patrol, clean areas, pedestrian paths, bike lanes.

Fitness Knowledge:

- Community classes, present alternative workout areas; provide healthy alternatives and promote a healthy lifestyle

Food Deserts/Quality of Food:

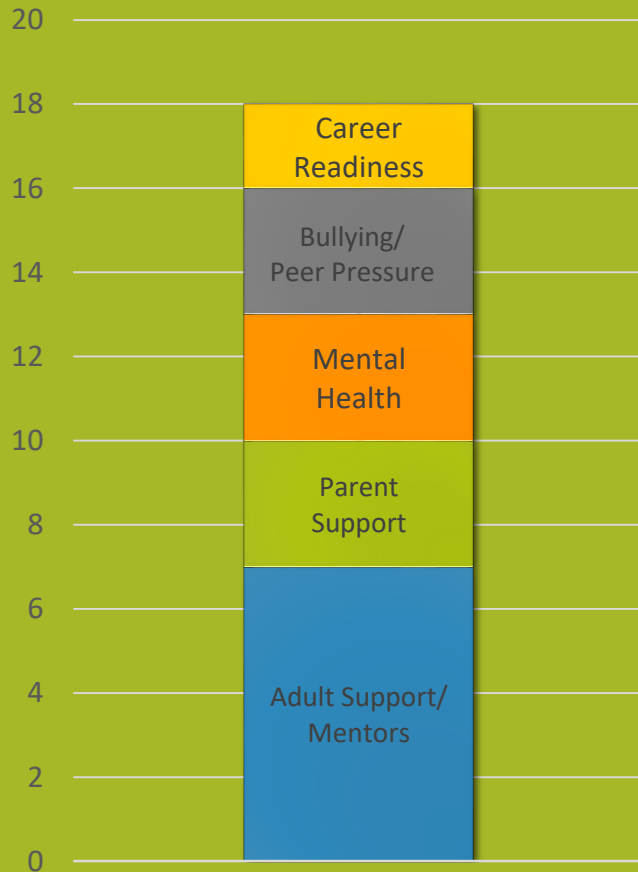
- Community gardens; mobile feeding stations, community cooking classes; link to obesity and areas with more fast food and less safe recreational sites (YMCA ,BGC, etc.)

Substance Use:

- How are marijuana and vaping so accessible to youth.

Career Readiness Programs:

- Discover better ways to identify alternative forms of vocational activities/business certifications

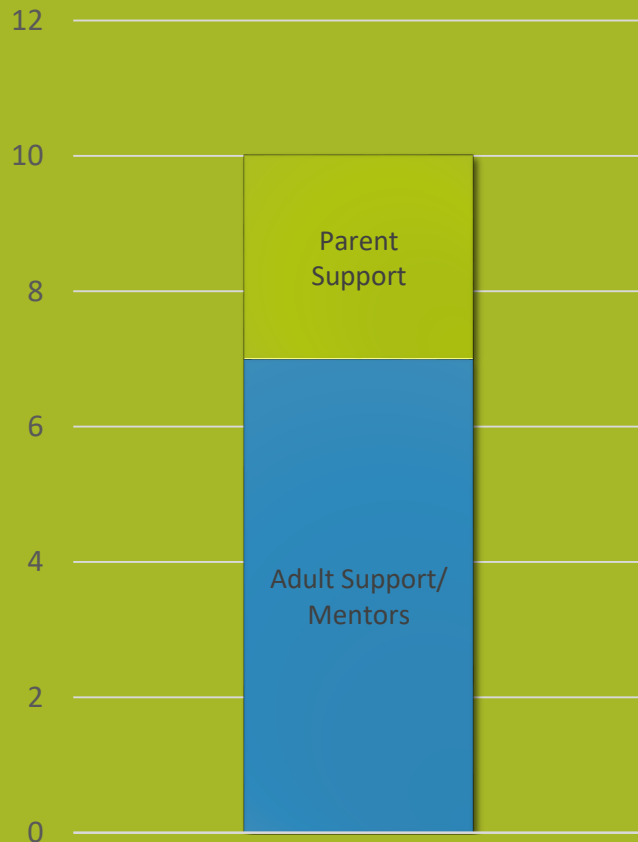

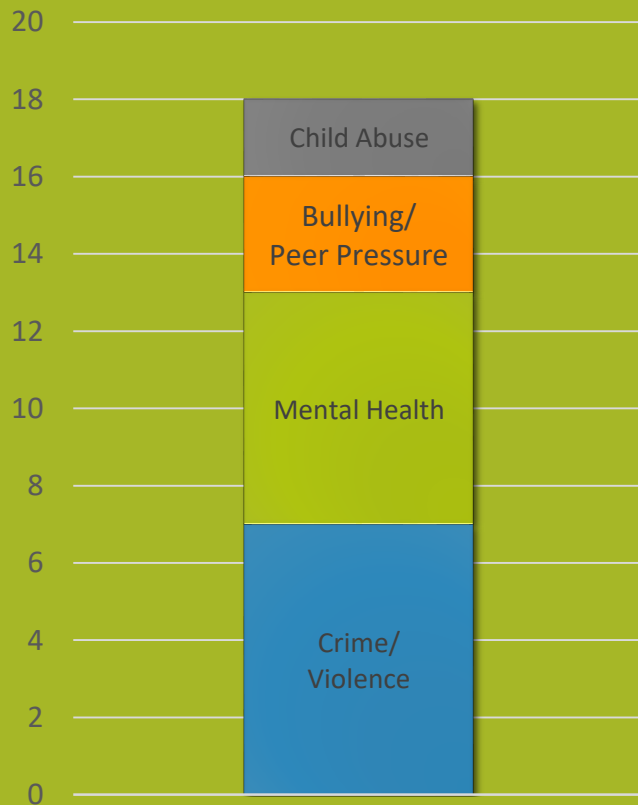

Suggestion:

- Focus on 3 zip codes - evaluate mentoring services, train officers on DMC/Red Committee, provide resources and education

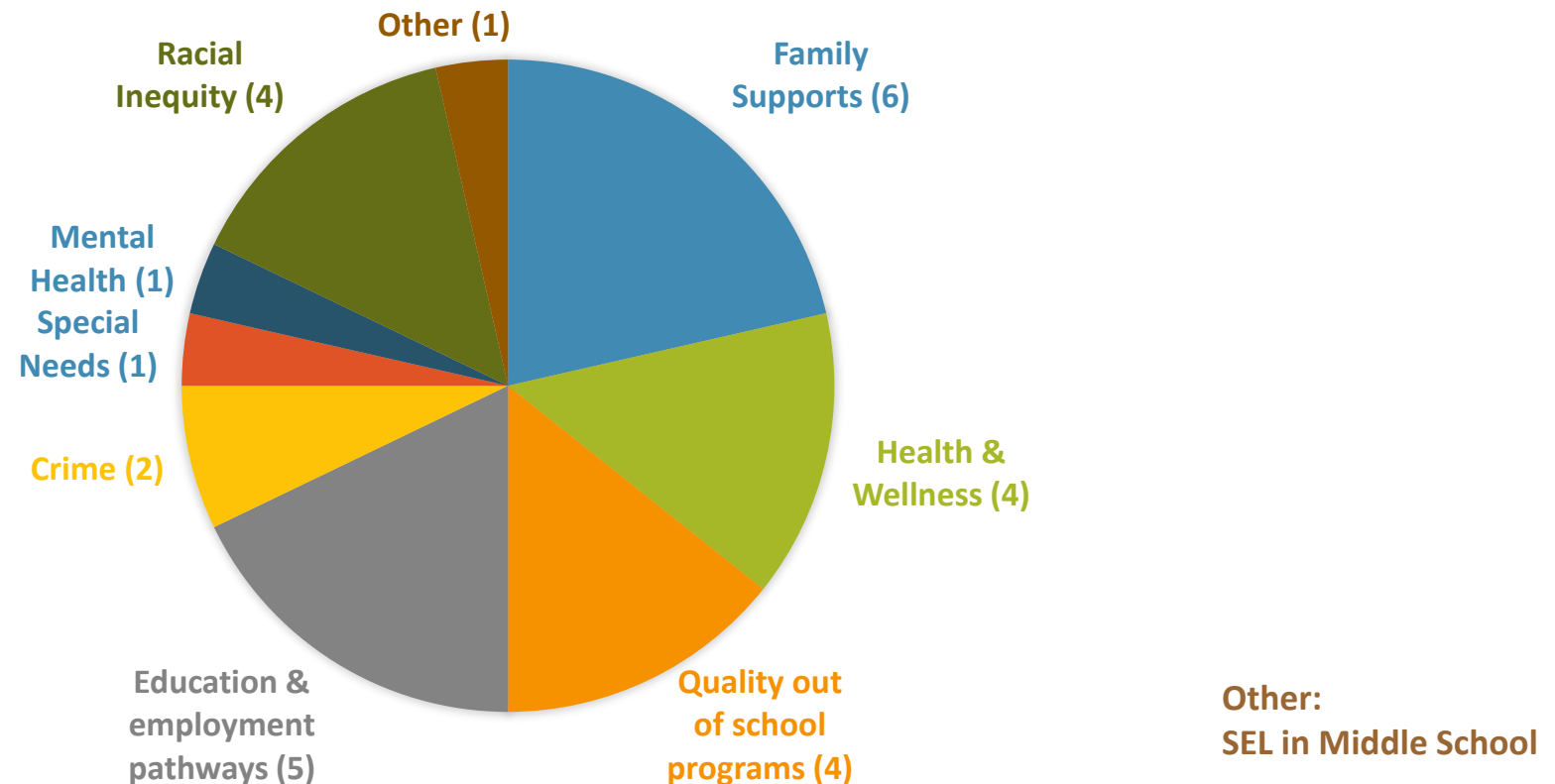

What are the 3 most important issues/biggest needs for our community?

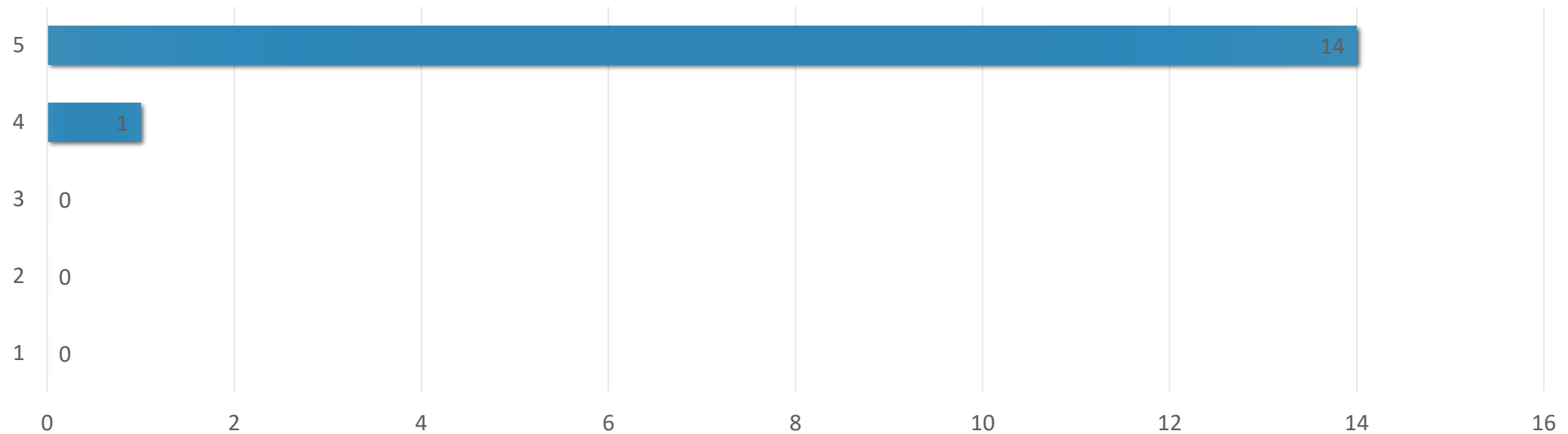
