Birth to 22 Hosts Annual Task Force Meeting

The Seventh Annual Birth to 22: United for Brighter Futures Task Force meeting was held at the Clayton E. Hutcheson Agricultural Center on January 16, 2024. After being held virtually for several years, this in-person event hosted over 100 participants, including parents, family members, school representatives, students, community members, and agency representatives. The meeting was split into two sessions: a review of the previous year and an interactive discussion about the Youth Master Plan 2.0 draft.

As Birth to 22 enters its 10th year as a collective impact, Tammy K. Fields, Palm Beach County Assistant County Administrator, and Lisa Williams-Taylor, CEO of the Children’s Services Council (CSC) of Palm Beach County, highlighted the 2023 accomplishments as well as the major milestones achieved over the last 10 years. The task force meeting was also a transitional moment as Tammy accepted a promotional opportunity within the county. She was thanked for her contributions and passion towards Birth to 22 and introduced the new Birth to 22 Steering Committee Co-Chair, Elisa Cramer, who is Interim Director of the Youth Services Department (YSD).

The task force meeting showcased two youth-led workgroups, Future Leaders: United for Change and the Girls Voice Task Force, which have hosted community service

projects, engaged youth in skill-building and leadership initiatives, and planned events throughout 2024.

The Youth Master Plan (YMP) serves as the blueprint for setting priorities and taking action to improve the lives of children and youth in Palm Beach County. Before the Task Force meeting, the registered participants were provided a draft of the “YMP 2.0,” an update of the plan based on community input and data. During the second session of the Task Force meeting, Jeanette Gordon, an independent consultant, facilitated discussions to gather feedback on the draft, including the strengths, gaps, and overall comprehensiveness of the proposed plan.

The new YMP focuses on youth transitioning to adulthood with strategic priority areas of mental health, economic access, and education while highlighting safety. Once finalized, this plan will guide the next three years of services and funding opportunities for the Birth to 22 Alliance.

Future Leaders and Girls Coordinating Council Season to Give

Birth to 22: Future Leaders and Girls Coordinating Council (GCC) kicked off the holiday season by collecting over 100 donated gifts in partnership with Digital Vibez and their annual Jingle Jamz, where Digital Vibez distributes gifts to youth in underserved communities within Palm Beach County. Teens are sometimes overlooked when it comes to toy drives, so this made way for GCC and Future Leaders to give back to all youth in Palm Beach County.

On December 8, 2023, Future Leaders gathered at Youth Services to wrap the gifts donated while enjoying a hot cocoa bar and holiday tunes provided by Digital Vibez. The youth

who participated received community service work hours to report to their schools. Future Leaders is a youth council in Palm Beach County that provides a platform for the voice of the youth of Palm Beach County, creating leaders through self-motivation, determination, and education.

As the group focuses on high school students to age 22, they provide a place and a space for these young adults to connect, engage, and inspire bi-monthly on the third Thursday at 50 S. Military Trail, West Palm Beach, FL 33415.

Tribute to Edna Runner

The Edna W. Runner Tutorial Center in Jupiter’s Limestone Creek neighborhood has helped thousands of students since its founding in 1986.

JUPITER — Edna Runner, a longtime Jupiter-area resident who ran a nonprofit education center that bears her name, died Friday at age 72.

“We are thankful to God that (Edna) was full of laughter and was showered with love by hundreds of the people whose lives she has impacted,” the Edna W. Runner Tutorial Center

said in a prepared statement posted on its social-media pages. “Edna was a community trailblazer who believed the children of West Jupiter deserved an opportunity to live the American dream.”

“While we are shocked and saddened by this devastating news, we know that it is our responsibility to continue her legacy and make sure that the Edna W. Runner Tutorial Center flourishes and is accessible for generations to come.”

Edna Runner’s tutorial centers helped thousands of kids in Limestone Creek area. Runner provided after-school care to thousands of at-risk students in Limestone Creek for 37 years. She said some of her favorite moments were her reunions with former students later in their lives. Runner served as executive director of the center since 2002, but her ties date back further to the Limestone Creek neighborhood north of Indiantown Road that the center calls home.

Rippel Podcast Features Unsung Steward Tammy Fields

Tammy K. Fields, Assistant County Administrator, was recently a guest on The Rippel Foundation’s Unsung Stewards podcast where she discussed the Palm Beach County Youth Services Department and Birth to 22’s work with youth. The conversation explored how trauma-informed services, centering youth voices, and encouraging individualism and creativity are ways to build resilience and belonging.



The podcast also highlighted how critical it is for young people to be included in the process of designing solutions to end youth homelessness. County Declares Dr. Joaquín García Day at High School Dedication Ceremony

Dance, step, cheer, choral and band performances along with inspiring speeches from diverse student and community leaders, as well as a Palm Beach County proclamation designating January 12, 2024, as Dr. Joaquín García Day, made for a memorable official dedication of Dr. Joaquín García High School.

Principal Oscar Otero spoke about the community effort that went into bringing to fruition the newest high school in nearly 20 years, both in terms of the physical building and the overall school family. Students proudly spoke about the inclusive school culture and the excitement they have to be part of the first Palm Beach County high school to be named after a Hispanic community leader.

Dr. Xavier Garcia, husband of the late Dr. Joaquín García, was one of many District and community leaders who

spoke about how Dr. Joaquín García was a fierce advocate for education and equity for all children, especially those who are underserved. Palm Beach County Commissioner Gregg Weiss read the county proclamation of Dr. Joaquín García Day and presented copies of the proclamation to Dr. Joaquín García’s family, Principal Otero, and School District administrators.

School Board Chair Karen Brill, Board Vice Chair Barbara McQuinn, School Board members, the Hispanic Education Coalition, Greenacres Mayor Joel Flores, Congresswoman Lois Frankel’s office, and many more community leaders, staff, family members and friends took part in the ceremony. La Vuelta Palm Beach and the Hispanic Education Coalition presented a check to the Dr. Joaquín García High School Fund and announced there will be a second annual La Vuelta bicycle riding fundraiser event later this year.



PIT Count

The Palm Beach County Youth Services Department joined several youth- and family-serving organizations to participate in the annual Point in Time Count, which was organized by the Palm Beach County Community Services Department in coordination with multiple departments. Stationed at Vita Nova during the evening, Assistant County Administrator Tammy Fields and Youth Services Department Interim Director Elisa Cramer helped organize Vita Nova’s clothing closet, which provides donated attire at no cost to teens and young adults served by Vita Nova. They also engaged in conversations with young adults who shared their personal experiences of housing insecurity and suggestions for capturing accurate counts of youth and young adults who are unsheltered.

The count occurred on Thursday, January 25, 2024, from 11 am-11 pm and Friday, January 26, 2024, from 4 am-12 pm.

Graduate Visits Communities In Schools of Palm Beach County

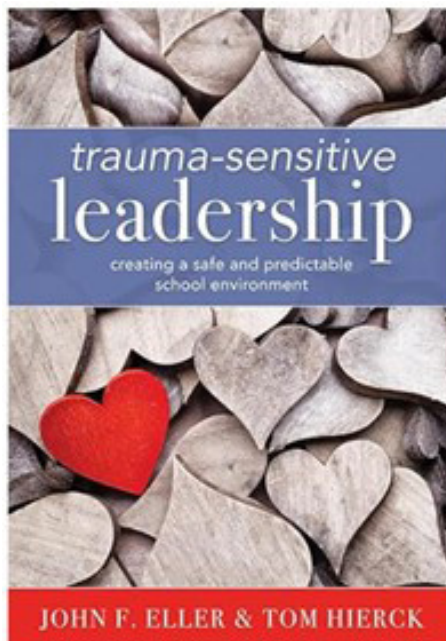

School District Emphasizes Trauma-Informed Care

The Department of Behavioral and Mental Health of the School District of Palm Beach County has taken the lead in the introduction and implementation of trauma informed care throughout the District in accordance with the Strategic Plan Initiative C.2b. Actions that have been initiated to move this work forward include a Leadership Book Study (*Trauma-Sensitive Leadership - Creating a Safe and Predictable School*

Environment by John F. Eller and Tom Hierck), providing training and support in Reducing the Impact of Secondary Trauma for District Mental Health Professionals, School Police, and Educators, the creation of a Trauma Informed Educator Professional Development Badge, and a quarterly Trauma Informed Care District Collaborative that focuses on how trauma affects the brain, foundational aspects of trauma, and trauma informed practices and strategies in schools. Congratulations to the School District of Palm Beach County in pioneering this work in the state of Florida!

Milagro Center continues to use the power of music and art to empower Delray Beach youth in after-school and summer camp programs. These, tied with a mix of academic support, mentoring and living values lessons, allow students to build a strong sense of self-worth and skills that set them on a path to a productive future.





Community Partners of South Florida Mentoring Programs

Community Partners of South Florida (CPSFL) provides quality school-based mentoring programs for Palm Beach County youth. Mentoring connects youth with caring adults who are committed to their social and emotional development. The goal of the mentoring program is to build protective factors, foster a sense of connectedness, and support social-emotional learning through a supportive, positive adult mentor/mentee relationship. In January 2024, Mentoring Program Director, Tina McNutt, along with her team: Millie Rodriguez and Dolores Rodriguez, attended the National Mentor Summit in Washington, DC. Ike Powell, Director of Outreach & Community Programming at Palm Beach County Youth

Services Department, and long-time supporter of the mentoring programs at CPSFL, was in attendance as well. CPSFL’s mentoring team had the opportunity to attend evidence-based workshops, experience inspirational keynote speakers, and share about the great strides being made in Palm Beach County. The team also had a chance to meet with national elected officials, such as Senators Rick Scott and Marco Rubio, as well as Congresswoman Sheila Cherfilus-McCormick.

Community Partners’ programs are based on Elements of Effective Practice for Mentoring™, and mentors/mentees meet and participate in supervised, structured activities at school-based sites during traditional after-school hours. The programs are currently offered at four schools in Palm Beach County: Highland Elementary School, Lake Worth Middle School, Pioneer Park Elementary School, and Pahokee Elementary School.
